Highly skilled experts



- Highly skilled professionals move abroad for career reasons
 - Voluntary mobility
 - Relatively well-off
 - Often temporary stays
 - Not nomads but may appear as nomadic

Schools

Most international schools in Finland

- are free municipal schools
- •follow the Finnish curriculums



In the capital city area, it is difficult to get into the international schools because they are full

→ children may end up in the preparatory classes of Finnish schools



Temporary expatriates and long-term integration goals

"Children do not integrate to Finland when they do not learn Finnish." (Finnish teacher)

Why do I need to learn these Finnish words? It's boring. I'm not going to need them. I'm going to move to a more interesting place. (Amir, 9)



- Intensive Finnish studies in the school
- Parents' language studies vs professional careers



Temporary stays and children

- School starts at the age of seven
 - Keep up with the school in one's passport country?

M: When you came to this school, was it easy to start studying?

S: Yeah. Because the things that we learn here I've already learned...Like I'm revising things more and more times.

M: Ok. So if you went to India now, what would happen?

S: I would be sad. I would be behind all my friends in India. And I don't want to go to India. (Sonu, 9 years)

The school is much better in Finland.

One can just relax and enjoy. (Ajey, 9 years)

- Preparatory class may be below one's age level
- Secondary education mostly in Finnish



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- Migrants are the target of various integration measures with long-term goals
- Temporary skilled professionals –"nomadic expatriates" – are an unknown category in the Finnish migration policies (or measures)
- → Children and families may end up in positions that may feel uncomfortable and unsuitable
- →If the family does not intend to settle down permanently but plans to (or must) continue nomadic lifestyle, children's education poses challenges
- nomads are not floating outside structures
